"We believe that a continuum of care and diverse pathways out of homelessness and poverty are essential for lasting change."

Programs prioritize housing as a cornerstone of stability. Through transitional housing, VOA provides temporary accommodations with supportive services such as job training and case management, helping individuals develop crucial life skills for independent living. For those with chronic health issues, disabilities or other barriers, VOA's permanent supportive housing model offers

long-term stability and integrates on-site support, fostering a sense of community vital for success.

VOA is grateful for partners like Wells Fargo, whose generous contributions have been vital in preventing homelessness. Their longstanding support has helped families on the verge of losing their homes by providing utility assistance, down payments and essential furnishings for those transitioning from shelters to new spaces. Individuals like Herschell and families like Yulianna's (pictured above) exemplify the hard work and determination that, combined with community support, have enabled them to achieve self-sufficiency.

For every individual and family grappling with the harsh reality of homelessness or poverty, VOA offers a compassionate and comprehensive solution designed to provide dignity and long-term stability.
